THE MINISTRY OF THE WORD

First Reading

2 Samuel 6.1-5, 12b-19

David again gathered all the chosen men of Israel, thirty thousand. David and all the people with him set out and went from Baale-judah, to bring up from there the ark of God, which is called by the name of the Lord of hosts who is enthroned on the cherubim. They carried the ark of God on a new cart, and brought it out of the house of Abinadab, which was on the hill. Uzzah and Ahio, the sons of Abinadab, were driving the new cart with the ark of God; and Ahio went in front of the ark. David and all the house of Israel were dancing before the Lord with all their might, with songs and lyres and harps and tambourines and castanets and cymbals.

It was told King David, 'The Lord has blessed the household of Obed-edom and all that belongs to him, because of the ark of God.' So David went and brought up the ark of God from the house of Obed-edom to the city of David with rejoicing; and when those who bore the ark of the Lord had gone six paces, he sacrificed an ox and a fatling. David danced before the Lord with all his might; David was girded with a linen ephod. So David and all the house of Israel brought up the ark of the Lord with shouting, and with the sound of the trumpet.

As the ark of the Lord came into the city of David, Michal daughter of Saul looked out of the window, and saw King David leaping and dancing before the Lord; and she despised him in her heart.

They brought in the ark of the Lord, and set it in its place, inside the tent that David had pitched for it; and David offered burnt-offerings and offerings of well-being before the Lord. When David had finished offering the burnt-offerings and the offerings of well-being, he blessed the people in the name of the Lord of hosts, and distributed food among all the people, the whole multitude of Israel, both men and women, to each a cake of bread, a portion of meat, and a cake of raisins. Then all the people went back to their homes.

THE LETTER OF PAUL TO THE Ephesians

Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who has blessed us in Christ with every spiritual blessing in the heavenly places, just as he chose us in Christ before the foundation of the world to be holy and blameless before him in love. He destined us for adoption as his children through Jesus Christ, according to the good pleasure of his will, to the praise of his glorious grace that he freely bestowed on us in the Beloved. In him we have redemption through his blood, the forgiveness of our trespasses, according to the riches of his grace that he lavished on us. With all wisdom and insight he has made known to us the mystery of his will, according to his good pleasure that he set forth in Christ, as a plan for

the fullness of time, to gather up all things in him, things in heaven and things on earth. In Christ we have also obtained an inheritance, having been destined according to the purpose of him who accomplishes all things according to his counsel and will, so that we, who were the first to set our hope on Christ, might live for the praise of his glory. The Gospel Mark 6.14-29

The Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Mark Glory to you Lord Jesus Christ.

King Herod heard of it, for Jesus' name had become known. Some were saying, 'John the baptizer has been raised from the dead; and for this reason these powers are at work in him.' But others said, 'It is Elijah.' And others said, 'It is a prophet, like one of the prophets of old.' But when Herod heard of it, he said, 'John, whom I beheaded, has been raised.'

For Herod himself had sent men who arrested John, bound him, and put him in prison on account of Herodias, his brother Philip's wife, because Herod had married her. For John had been telling Herod, 'It is not lawful for you to have your brother's wife.' And Herodias had a grudge against him, and wanted to kill him. But she could not, for Herod feared John, knowing that he was a righteous and holy man, and he protected him. When he heard him, he was greatly perplexed; and yet he liked to listen to him. But an opportunity came when Herod on his birthday gave a banquet for his courtiers and officers and for the leaders of Galilee. When his daughter Herodias came in and danced, she pleased Herod and his guests; and the king said to the girl, 'Ask me for whatever you wish, and I will give it.' And he solemnly swore to her, 'Whatever you ask me, I will give you, even half of my kingdom.' She went out and said to her mother, 'What should I ask for?' She replied, 'The head of John the baptizer.' Immediately she rushed back to the king and requested, 'I want you to give me at once the head of John the

Baptist on a platter.' The king was deeply grieved; yet out of regard for his oaths and for the guests, he did not want to refuse her. Immediately the king sent a soldier of the guard with orders to bring John's head. He went and beheaded him in the prison, brought his head on a platter, and gave it to the girl. Then the girl gave it to her mother. When his disciples heard about it, they came and took his body, and laid it in a tomb.

This is the Gospel of the Lord.

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SEA SUNDAY, 14 JULY

Then I saw another angel flying in midheaven, with an eternal gospel to proclaim to those who live on the earth, to every nation and tribe and language and people. Revelation 14.6.

As I sit and write this, I am an hour's drive from the sea, and for others it is even further. But for nearly 2 million people who call the sea their home they face away from the land, not towards it. Their country is the thousands of kms of wide, open sea, their highway to the next port. Despite the best meteorological assistance available to ships, the sea still remains changing and highly dangerous, and the history is sobering.

Those growing up in the 1970's and 80's might remember Gordon Lightfoot's ballad, The Wreck of the Edmund Fitzgerald, written and sung in 1976. The SS Edmund Fitzgerald traversed Lake Superior on 9 November 1975, a 25,000 tonne freighter carrying ore pellets, bound for Detroit. Encountering a heavy storm she sank with all 29 hands.

I joined the Missions to Seafarers when the tragedy of the MV Derbyshire was still fresh in people's minds. Lost on 9 September 1980 during Typhoon

Orchid, south of Japan, all 42 crew members and 2 of their wives were killed. At 91,655 tons she is the largest British ship ever to have been lost at sea. Today, danger may come more often from piracy, but the wide, open sea remains as ever, unpredictable.

Sea Sunday, on 14 July, once again gives thanks for the work of the largest mission in the Anglican Communion, the Missions to Seafarers. Founded in Bristol, UK, in 1856, the first 'station' or centre, was opened in Australia in 1906/07 when the Victorian Seamen's Mission (itself founded in 1857) merged with the Mission. Today the centre at 717 Flinders Street, serving the Port of Melbourne is not only the oldest but the largest mission in the country.

There are 27 centres around the country where seafarers know they can go for physical, spiritual and emotional support. The centres are largely staffed by volunteers and often provide transport from ships docked in port to the local mission. The number of seafarers attending centres since 2022 has increased from 23,263 to 78,193, which shows how effective and needed the ministry of the mission is. Sadly, the increase in volunteers has been much smaller, rising from 309 to only 375.

The challenges facing seafarers are multilayered and complex. At the forthcoming annual Conference in Fremantle, the conference speakers will cover a range of subjects from ship visiting, piracy, bullying and harassment, port welfare committees, and cruise ships. To respond to the short turnaround times in port and the increasingly smaller crews the Mission has developed both the Seafarers Happiness Index (which kind of shipping has the most stress related crews?), and the Happy at Sea App enabling seafarers to access a range of services.
